



Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ!

On October 12, 2025 a group of about 40 congregants gathered after the Sunday morning service to prayerfully discuss and imagine what our church might become over the next 5 years. The intent was to celebrate the growth and development we experienced over the last two years and form a vision for what God might call us to do in the future. This was a conversation open to all in the congregation. Feedback was gathered from attendees on a series of guiding questions. I ask you to read over the summery I offer below. It's quite inspiring! God bless you as we celebrate the final month of fall and look forward to Advent!

Guiding Questions

Questions to consider the present conditions of our congregation were as follows.

- What do you love about St. James?
- · What makes us distinct from other churches in our area?
- What are we doing today that we should keep doing in the future?
- What are we doing today that should be left behind so we can move into our future?

Questions to consider what our church might become in the future were as follows.

- What might we look like in 2030 and how does that differ from what we are now?
- How might God be calling us to love our neighbors in the next 3-5 years?
- What do we need to start doing now to prepare for that future?

Congregational Responses

Many themes emerged as part of this conversation. Concerning the current status of our congregational life, the following elements were highlighted.

- We love St. James because it is a friendly congregation where one can be known and remembered. Many of us feel loved and cared for through relationships in the church, prayer for each other, and many other ways our congregation helps us to know that we are not alone such as the Friendly Visitor Committee and pastoral care. Additionally, streaming our services on YouTube helps us stay connected with those who cannot make it to a weekend service for various reasons.
- We have ways of participating in the congregation that we enjoy such as singing in the choir, modern and classic worship options, reliable pastoral leadership, and an increase in attendance at worship.
- We have ways of serving those in need in our communities through hunger ministries such as serving meals at Zion Lutheran (ELCA) in Davenport and St. James Food Pantry which is housed in the Lower Level of our church building.
- Many of us found St. James and stayed here because it is close to where we live (or lived when we started attending) which made getting to church easier than traveling out of the neighborhood.
- Many of us have deep roots at St. James because our families grew up here. Some multigenerational families are still active participants in our congregational life.
- We love St. James because what we talk about at church on the
 weekend applies to the whole of our lives. It is practical and not
 at all separate from what we face at home and in the world. This
 is especially true in the content of our liturgical prayers,
 sermons, "talk back" at the Saturday service, and monthly
 Coffee and Conversation meetups after the Sunday morning
 service.

The following qualities and ministries are seen as distinctives of our congregation and present opportunities for development in the future.

- We are Lutherans. In particular, we are ELCA Lutherans. This comes with a unique contribution to the world and is a needed witness in our region. As ELCA Lutherans we are quick to include people on the margins of society. We give anyone the opportunity to be welcomed into God's family. This distinct identity is reflected in our worship services on Saturday nights and Sunday mornings. These two services are stylistically distinct but are both faithfully Lutheran. Because these services are on different days, at different times of the day, and stylistically distinct, we feel this opens the doors wide to people who are looking to worship and enrich their faith in non-coercive yet substantially formative environments.
- The presence of the St. James Food Pantry in our Lower Level makes us unique compared to other churches in our area. We are proud of being able to host this ministry and pray the ministry will continue. Our people faithfully support the Pantry in various ways mostly through financial contributions and food drives. The leadership of the pantry has faithfully served in their roles for 14 years. In our present economy, the need in our community has increased and the supply, especially from River Bend Food Bank has decreased. Keeping the shelves stocked has become increasingly difficult. Over the next 3-5 years our congregation will need to find ways to support the leadership of the pantry if it is going to stay open. Resources of time and money are perpetually needed.
- Because of our size, we know each other and can keep tabs on each other in loving and supportive ways. This is especially true of our young people who move away for college and those who are connected to us who serve in the military.
- We have a great many children at most of our services. This is not typical of larger trends in mainline Protestantism and ELCA congregations of our size across the country. Having a "critical"

mass" of young people provides an environment where other families with young people can more easily connect to us.

Concerning the future vitality of our congregational life, the following elements were highlighted.

- Youth Outreach: Many people voiced curiosity about a mission to include people in the 16-26 age range in our church. The shape of an outreach/ministry to this demographic is entirely unknown. We acknowledge this demographic is experiencing a resurgence in engagement with Christian faith. Our approach to Christian faith should be among those options being considered. Is this a place where the church wants to put its energy in the future? Perhaps an open meeting on this topic would be useful at a future date.
- Serving in Church Ministries: Some of our committees and other generalized responsibilities around the church are maintained by faithful people who have been in those roles for many years. In some cases, those faithful people would like to transition into other ways of serving or would like help in their current work. We all would benefit from additional attention on how to make those needs known and how to welcome people into new ways to serve the church.
- Communication: General communication about the happenings around the church, how things work in our decision-making, and schedules for various roles should continue to improve. Perhaps posting information about our committees including what they do and who to contact if one wants to join a committee would help the congregation understand the work that continually happens but is less visible to the public eye. Information could be posted in various places including the Narthex, monthly newsletter (The Epistle), email announcements, and our weekly service bulletin.
- Open, Public Dialogue: We want to keep talking as a congregation in open ways (such as a Stakeholders Meeting) throughout the year.

- These and other means are helpful to stay connected, get involved, and speak about the state of our church. More opportunities like this should be a part of our future.
- Telling Our Story: Further develop the good work of the Communications Guild. We would benefit from more outreach at public events such as the Farmer's Market in Davenport, events being held in our building, and social media presence.
 Additional ideas include: sending hard copies of our newsletter to visitors, targeting schools for communication (colleges, trade schools, high schools, etc.), and campus groups such as the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FAC).
- We may want to consider updating our sound system and fixing
 the live audio feed to other parts of the building. This used to be
 a feature for worship, but it has not worked for some time.
 Additionally, the audio pickups in our sound system are blended
 together which makes it hard to adjust volumes for mics and
 other amplification devices for worship.
- We see a great deal of underutilized potential in the Saturday night service. Regular attenders on Sunday might consider coming to the Saturday service occasionally to be a body in the room. This helps when new people come so that it feels warmer and livelier.

Conclusion

This summary intends to provide an overview of the main themes of the meeting. It does not intend to include every comment from each individual contributor. Additional ideas may be submitted to Council or the Presiding Minister by phone, in person, or through email. All contributions will be duly considered for the health and vitality of our church.








St James GANG
